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OHIO ACTION ALERT:

Keep Pressure on Your Representative to Vote YES on Equal Housing and Employment Act (HB 176)!

The General Assembly Session was scheduled to end on June 30, 2009. However, because the budget has not been approved, Session is still on-going - for an indeterminate amount of time. As long as the House remains in Session, HB 176 (the Equal Housing and Employment Act) could get a vote at any time. We may have no more than a few hours notice. HB 176 remains on the agenda for a vote by the House, but only budget related items are getting attention these days.

This is our best shot, right now, to get the Equal Housing and Employment Act (HB 176) passed. It will only get harder if it doesn't happen in this General Assembly (2009-2010). Opponents of HB 176 are working hard to keep equality out of reach of Ohioans. This CAN NOT be stressed enough. Our work needs to continue, and we must continue to show our support of our elected officials and continue to educate them on issues that transgender people face.

So what can you do? Until the Session goes on recess or a vote occurs on the House floor this summer, keep your focus on the House Members:

- Thank the sponsors again and again - they are getting a lot of pressure from opponents of the bill to withdraw their support.
- Send this Action Alert to your legislator.
- Find out when your legislator is having local Town Halls or other constituent meetings.
- Write Letter to the Editors in your local newspapers.
- Ask around and find out who the local people of influence are. Talk to them about HB 176 and ask them to talk to the Representative about the EHEA.
- Ask others you know in your area - friends, family, fellow members of faith communities or organizations, neighbors - to make calls, send email, write letters to the editor, schedule coffees, and talk to local people of influence.

Trans Inclusive ENDA Introduced to Congress

Representative Barney Frank, along with 118 co-sponsors, announced the introduction of a fully inclusive Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) - which would extend the existing federal law prohibiting employment discrimination to protect people on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity.

NCTE is calling on its members to be very actively involved in the process of passing the bill, including visiting their members of Congress during the summer.

Equal Housing and Employment Act (HB 176) - What You Can Do!

Equality Ohio

So what can you do? Until the Session goes on recess or a vote occurs on the House floor this summer, keep your focus on the House Members:

1. Thank the sponsors again and again - they are getting a lot of pressure from opponents of the bill to withdraw their support.

Current sponsors include: Stewart, McGregor, Blair, Boyd, Brown, Carney, Celeste, Chandler, Driehaus, Foley, Garland, Hagan, Harris, Harwood, Heard, Koziura, Letson, Luckie, Mallory, Skindell, Sykes, Ujvagi, B. Williams, S. Williams, Winburn, Yates, and Yuko.

2. Send an Action Alert to your Representative.
3. Find out when your legislator is having local Town Halls or other constituent meetings. Tell us about it so we can alert others. Attend these meetings and talk about HB 176.

Opponents of the bill are already doing this.

Set up a coffee meeting with your representative and talk about HB 176.

4. Write Letter to the Editors in your local newspapers.
5. Ask around and find out who the local people of influence are. Talk to them about HB 176 and ask them to talk to the Representative about the EHEA. These might be business people, faith leaders, etc.
6. Ask others you know in your area - friends, family, fellow members of faith communities or organizations, neighbors - to make calls, send email, write letters to the editor, schedule coffees, and talk to local people of influence.

Opponents of HB 176 are not letting up and neither can we.

Sending an email through our Action Alerts takes only a few minutes and could make the difference. Why It is Important to take action on ENDA

Employment is one of the greatest challenges we face as transgender people. We face staggering levels of under- and unemployment because of prejudice. Yet a strong majority (65%) of

Americans in a 2004 poll felt that people should only be judged on their ability to do the job, not their gender identity. Anti-discrimination laws send a clear message to employers and co-workers that discrimination is wrong and not to be tolerated.

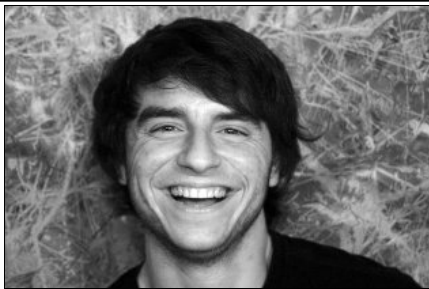

Transgender Artist Briden Cole Schueren Center on High, Saturday, August 1, 2009, 5pm-9pm~Gallery Hop “*Blurring the Lines of Gender*”



Columbus, Ohio artist, Briden Cole Schueren, has always had a different kind of perspective on life. He's extremely energetic and fast-paced. He's got a love of playing with movement which "is why many of [his] pieces tend to be very fluid while blurring the lines in-between colors."

Schueren says that he "loves making art that pushes boundaries and makes people think. You could say that I like playing around with fire," in reference to being able to make people squirm.

"I feel so free and at ease when I am painting or doing a photo shoot! When I have a camera or a paintbrush in my hand I am truly at peace. It's very Zen like for me. I just want to be able to go crazy on a huge stretch of canvas, painting all over it and rolling around adding different layers and media types. I love making stories with my art. Alternatively, I also love allowing stories to inspire my work. I just feel it gives so much more meaning to every minute that I put into each piece," says Schueren.

Besides art, Briden's other passion is rowing. He is currently a rowing coach for a women's high school varsity team and couldn't be any more proud and happy to be part of that experience. In college, Schueren had to leave his rowing team because of "regulations." Thankfully, he's been able to get back involved with a sport that he loves!

This collection, *Blurring the Lines of Gender* explores, interweaving paintings, photographs, mixed media pieces, sculptures, and recycled materials and highlights elements of blurring the lines of gender and human interaction. *Blurring the Lines of Gender* explores just one of Schueren's many artistic styles, namely a playful use of vivid colors and fluid movements, while playing with the gender binary.

Schueren's work will be on display at The Center on High (Stonewall Columbus) in the heart of the Short North Arts District, during the month of August. "We're thrilled that Briden is going to share this part of himself. I love his work. He's bright and full of life. Not to mention, he is open about his personal journey of transitioning, female-to-male. His work represents that journey, the highs and the lows. Briden's showing is our kick-off event for our 2nd annual Transgender and Ally Symposium. It is a wonderful opportunity to educate general society about issues and experiences that transgender people face," says Shane Morgan, Founder of TransOhio.



Schueren says, "This show is very special to me and personal, because I get to show a big part of my life that I struggled through, yet came out stronger and happy on the other side. I am so grateful and lucky to say I was born with a couple 'extra parts'. I have been able to experience life in such a different way; Blissful and beautiful while very scary, and you can see that in the way I express my art."

Keynote Speaker Helen Boyd, is author of *My Husband Betty* which was a finalist for a Lambda Literary Award. Her second book, *She's Not the Man I Married: My Life with a Transgender Husband* was published in 2007. Besides being an author, Helen is an activist, academic and also partner to a transgender woman. Boyd's been running online groups since 2000 and has presented workshops at many conferences and has given keynote talks at gatherings such as First Event. Boyd's writing has also appeared in anthologies and she lectures regularly at colleges. Boyd has also taught Gender Studies courses at Merrimack College (MA) and at Lawrence University (WI), where she also taught a course on transgender lives. She was also a finalist for a 2009 A Room of Her Own Foundation Grant.

Melissa Marie Alexander, JD, CMP, is a transgendered woman living in the Columbus area. She lives fulltime as her true self and has been in transition for over a year. Melissa has undergone FFS and underwent Gender Confirmation Surgery in May 2009. Melissa works as a meeting and event planning where she has obtained the CMP designation which is only held by about twenty percent of her industry. She is currently on the Board of Directors for the Ohio Chapter of Meeting Professionals International as the Director of Communications. Prior to her work in this field, Melissa practiced employment and labor law for twenty years in West Virginia and she has been admitted to practice in West Virginia and Kentucky as well as several federal courts. Melissa obtained her undergraduate degree at Northern Kentucky University in 1982 in Political Science (cum laude) and graduated 22nd of 140 in her law class at West Virginia University in 1985. Melissa is in a committed relationship with her partner Paula and she has two adult children from her previous marriage. Melissa is also very proud of her involvement with TransOhio and NCTE.

Tara McKenzie Allison, Esq., is a resident of Columbus, Ohio. She was born and raised in south-central Pennsylvania. After graduating from high school in 1981, she enlisted in the US Navy and was trained as a nuclear reactor operator. After serving as an enlisted man for 2 years she entered the US Naval Academy in Annapolis and graduated in 1987 and was commissioned as a Naval Officer. According to the Naval Academy Alumni Association, she is only the second MTF transgender person that they know of that has graduated from USNA. Tara graduated from Capital University Law School and was admitted to the Ohio Bar in 2005.

David Brandebura, R.Ph., is the Director of Pharmacy at The Apothecary Shops in Columbus. In September 2006, David joined The Apothecary Shops, a family of independent, community pharmacies located throughout Arizona, Nevada and Ohio, and

opened the company's second out-of-state pharmacy. Prior to joining the company, he was a pharmacist at New Albany Surgical Hospital. David's areas of expertise include ophthalmology, women's health and diabetes. Through the American College of Apothecaries (ACA), he is certified in compounding and aseptic compounding techniques. David is a registered pharmacist in Ohio, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, Tennessee and Arkansas. He has more than 17 years of pharmacy experience.

Stephanie Battaglino, is a nationally-recognized activist and speaker on transgender issues. She is the Communications Director for IFGE, the International Foundation for Gender Education, and sits on their Board of Directors. She is also the Chair of the IFGE endowment fund, The Winslow Street Fund. She is a member of the Transgender Advisory Committee of Out & Equal Workplace Advocates, the national organization promoting workplace equality for the LGBT community. Stephanie has keynoted at both the IFGE and Southern Comfort Conferences and is a Communications Director at New York Life Insurance Co., where she successfully transitioned on the job in October of 2005. She is the first transgendered person to do so in the 164-year history of the company.

Edward Bowers was born in 1957 in Northeastern Ohio. His undergraduate work was completed at Kent State University and Graduate work completed at The Ohio State University in Educational Administration. Bowers moved to Columbus in 1988 and became involved in political activism. Volunteering in AIDS Education and Outreach along with mentoring within the Leather Community. Membership in The National Leather Association, Ohio Splash Swim Team, Centurions of Columbus, Titleholder in Great Lakes Leather Alliance in 2004. Contest Director in Great Lakes Leather Alliance 2006-2008.

Joni, who started The Open Door Coffeehouse is in its sixth year. She is a community educator for Working for a Hate Free Society/All the People. Dr. James Buccigross, Ph.D., DABPS is a licensed clinical psychologist, and also a board-certified forensic clinical psychologist & neuropsychologist who has worked in both the juvenile and adult criminal justice & correctional systems for over 25 years and has had experience working with transgendered youth who have become involved with the juvenile courts and with juvenile detention & corrections. He has also worked with transgendered adults not involved with the justice system and has specialized in working with LGBTQ clients when he was previously in private practice prior to going overseas. He is currently the Northeastern Ohio Regional Psychologist for the Ohio Department of Youth Services, working with youth committed to the ODYS who are currently on parole in 19 counties in NE Ohio.

Merâl Crane, M.A., L.P.C.C., I.M.F.T., has served in the East Coast (1973-1975), and in Central Ohio (since 1975) as a therapist, educator, and activist, always acknowledging Gender Diversity, to help create a society that is respectful of diversity in general, and of persons with trans issues, in particular. Over the last three decades, as Founder and Clinical Director of the Gender Program of Central Ohio (the GPCO, 1979), she has worked with LGBTQI individuals in relation to their partners, children, families, friends and colleagues at the workplace and has aided many in their GENDER AFFIRMATION process.

Dr. Elena A. Christofides, MD, FACE, is owner & physician of Endocrinology Associates, Inc. which is located in Columbus, Ohio. Endocrinology Associates is an adult-only specialty practice under the direction of Dr. Elena A. Christofides. Dr. Christofides focuses on diabetes, osteoporosis, hypercholesterolemia, hypertension, polycystic ovarian syndrome, pituitary disorders, male and female hormone replacement, thyroid disorders and transgender issues. Her current research interest are GLBT Studies, feminism, queer theory, ethnic studies, film and media studies, fat studies and sex work. Her dissertation is tentatively entitled: "Reel Gender: The Politics of Trans Representations in Film and Television." Her goal is to examine the ways that trans images function politically, and how they have shifted historically. What affect do these images have on furthering acceptance of gender diversity in society and on countering cultural transphobia?

Ellen Seigel, LISW-S, ACHT, T/B/L/G activist, teacher and public speaker. She received her Master of Social Work degree from Yeshiva University and she has been in private practice for 28 years. She obtained her credentials as an Advanced Clinical Hypnotherapist through the Wellness Institute in Washington State. She is a Certified Behavioral Therapist and has training in Trauma Memory Resolution, EMDR, Subtle Energy and Psychic and Spiritual Development and is a Reiki Master. She has received recognition for advocacy from GLSEN New York City and the New York State Legislature.

Love, as Passion, Baby --- Shout it Loud and Act it Out --- however it goes --- Show Your Love, Baby, Love.

Emma Southard, is a Social Work and Women's, Gender and Sexuality Studies major at the University of Cincinnati. Emma has participated in much leadership and diversity training and education through the Racial Awareness Program at UC. They have been involved with Genderbloc, a radical queer student group for over two years. In this group they have organized queer events, brought queer speakers and performers to UC, worked for trans-inclusive policies, and attended conferences. She also works at the University Wellness Center and as a Peer Advocate for Reclaim, which provides support to survivors of sexual assault.

JAC Stringer is the founder of The GenderQueer Coalition of Cincinnati and the Ohio Gender-Identity-Variance Research Project. He is currently employed as the LGBTQAIP Coordinator at Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio. A Cincinnati native, he has dedicated his activist career to bettering the city and the state for genderqueer and queer populations. He is a Walnut Hills High School Alumni (2002) and has a B.A. in Psychology with a minor in Sexuality Studies from the University of Cincinnati. While attending the University of Cincinnati he founded the genderqueer radical activist group GenderBloc, the Queer Peer Education Program, and a Student Movement for a University-Funded Queer Student Center. In 2008, he founded the University's first queer publication, *The Queer Canon Zine*, where he served as an editor and writer. He is a lobbyist on the Advocates for Youth Ohio Council for Sex Education Reform, an AmplifyYourVoice.org Front Page Blogger, and a GLSEN High School Gay-Straight Alliance Mentor for Walnut Hills High School. JAC is pursuing independent research in sexology and gender studies focusing on non-pathologized gender variance, GID reform, and queer sexualities.

"You look like a Freak": Influences of Gender on Societal Recognition

Identity is communicated through gender expression. Societal gender norms determine what behaviors and expressions are culturally acceptable and create a concept of normalcy. Normalcy is the key determinant in societal recognition. We group identities based on recognizable traits that align to gender normative expectations. Atypical expressions in sex, sexuality, gender identity, and gender presentation that exist outside a heteronormative construct lack normalcy. This lack of normalcy results in marginalization, denial of societal recognition, and the label of "freak."

This workshop evaluates the cultural concept of normalcy and how it affects members of the queer, and more specifically the transgender and genderqueer community. It will cover gender identity, sexuality, desire, and how these elements play into the presentation and creation of freaks. It will also discuss who enforces the rules of gender expression, why we feel we have to follow them, and how we can break them.

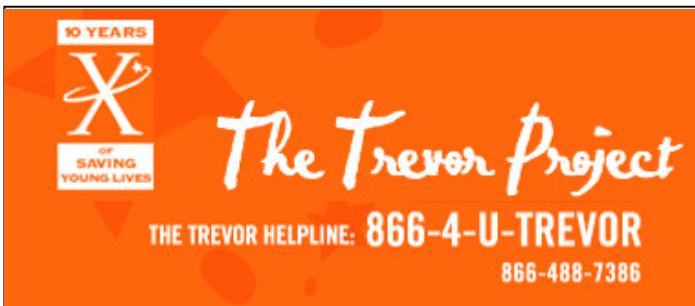

- Know your limits, Get help and Act quickly if you think your friend is in danger

Don't

- Make your friend's problem sound unimportant
- Act shocked or Keep your friend's suicide plans a secret
- Try to take any weapon away from your friend
- Leave your friend alone when he or she is in crisis
- Assume that your friend is simply having a bad day
- Take on the responsibility of your friend's safety by yourself or Stop being a good friend, no matter what
- Lose patience if your friend tries to reject your help

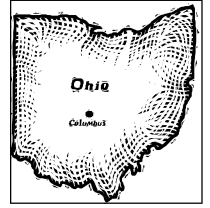
The Stephanie Chaffin Fund
